The Gothic aspects appear in the poem's dark themes of death and loss. The narrator's obsession with Annabel Lee, even after her death, and the eerie setting of the "kingdom by the sea" evoke a sense of melancholy and the supernatural, common in Gothic literature. The use of mournful imagery and the suggestion of a malevolent force—implied to have caused Annabel Lee's death—adds to the Gothic atmosphere, highlighting the intersection of love and tragedy.
